#### W.D.D.C. mini trial at Prestwood 09.07.23

#### "what3words"?

#### **Trepidation-Anticipation-Satisfaction**"

'Trepidation' would be the word for my state of mind on the morning of 9<sup>th</sup> July. I'd entered the Very Small Equine class at WDDC, walked the obstacles and cones the afternoon before (in the pouring rain), recited the dressage test to super-groom Madge on the journey, and now it was time to put to and get going. I don't know if everyone has nerves about competing, but I certainly do! And that's why WDDC is such a fantastic club to be part of; there's always someone around to lend a hand and quell the nerves. On this particular day, it was Gav who turned up to hold the ponies while I faffed and fussed, forgetting essentials like the whip and gloves, and fumbling with ties on the number bib.

'Trepidation' still abounded as Hero jiggled and wiggled towards the dressage arena but with Madge on the backstep and lots of lovely stewards around with smiley faces, I was beginning to get a grip and remember that I was supposed to be in charge, not the pair of little tear-aways in front of me. As is often the case for me, most of the dressage test was a bit of a blur; that is until I made that final turn onto the centre line and realised that I had no idea what came next! Seeing a helpful white line at D, I opted to walk (wrong), then I executed the rein back, halt and salute in a novel sequence which was also wrong. Our judge, Gill, gave me a friendly smile as I mouthed 'Sorry' and we exited with me feeling a bit of a twit. Looking at the sheet afterwards, with the ration of higher marks to 4's approaching 50:50 and a kind comment that it was a "Shame about movements 10 and 12", I decided that there was room for improvement.

By now 'anticipation' had taken over from 'trepidation' and we were raring to go in the cones. I had never gone clear in a cones round so my expectations were modest to say the least, but I put into practice the excellent training of the previous weekend and held the lines with a forward trot. And it worked....in part.....no balls were dislodged but there was a ruck of time penalties where I'd 'got lost' and been unable to count above 15! Not to worry about any of that, though; I just need my thinking speed to catch up with the speed of the ponies' legs, then we'll be fine.

The marathon was mesmerising; literally! I'd walked the obstacles the day before and been walking them in my dreams all night, but even with that degree of physical and mental practice, actually driving them correctly eluded me...at least at the first attempt. By the time we approached Obs. 3 and 4, Madge and the ponies had learned the course and my room for error was so reduced that I actually enjoyed the whole thing!

Both Madge and I regretted our early departure before the end of the competition, but she had a family event planned for early evening and if I wanted to keep my groom, I had to get her home in time. It would have been great to enjoy cake and a cuppa and share our thoughts on the day; definitely next time.

'Satisfaction' was the feeling as we drove home. Hero and Sadie had been exceptional. They are a pair of kind, willing ponies who always try hard and are very forgiving of duff instructions from me. Madge had had her first experience of back-stepping and navigating; both useful skills that don't appear in the school curriculum. I had thoroughly enjoyed being in the company of old and new friends and felt that the challenges of the day were well met.

Immense thanks are due to all the hard-working and dedicated committee at WDDC without whom such events could not take place. Tony Bache was mowing the centre line

in the rain on Saturday afternoon. That is an act of dedication to the quality of the sport that few competitors would know or realise. Special thanks, Tony; that lovely mown centre line was great, even though I forgot the movements as I drove up it!
